Second Sunday of Easter or Sunday of Divine Mercy

22-24

"Of all the ways Jesus could have greeted the apostles on Easter Sunday, he chose four simple words: "Peace be with you" (John 20:19). Jesus had just died on the Cross and is now risen from the dead and sharing a special moment with his disciples. He did the most divine and miraculous event in all of Salvation history and could have immediately spoke to disciples of their salvation, but instead shared a simple greeting that had profound meaning, "Peace be with you." Why this greeting? Remember that during this time after seeing Jesus crucified, the disciples were afraid and locked themselves in the upper room. They were experiencing their own weaknesses and lack of faith, worried that authorities would be after them, too. They felt ashamed of their own lack of faith, but Jesus understands and gives them exactly what is needed... a sense of overwhelming peace. Jesus extends this same peace to each of us.

An article from *The Word Among Us*, shares that there are two kinds of peace, peace for ourselves and peace with each other. The disciples weren't perfect, and neither are we, but Jesus gives us this gift of peace because we are beloved by God. Knowing this love and loving God in return brings the peace we long for and helps us follow Jesus and fulfill his calling for us. Jesus went on to say after his greeting, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." We are called to treat others with the same mercy and love that he has shown us. The Easter Season celebrates this peace as every obstacle to peace has been removed. Jesus is our forgiving Savior! Alleluia! Peace be with you!

Missionary Discipleship: In today's first reading, we can reflect on what a community looks like when it encounters the risen Christ. In this community of believers, Jesus takes the center stage in our lives, not money, or material goods. We are called to hold loosely our possessions so that we can care for those in need.

Family Table Talk

Children: How can you believe in Jesus whom you have never seen?


Youth: Jesus' words of greeting were "Peace be with you," followed by the invitation to forgive sins. How does forgiveness bring peace to you? How does it change the world?

"Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word."




Family Fun... April 13 Scrabble Day

Liturgy of the Word: It's all NEW Testament!

In the Easter season, our Church reads from the Acts of the Apostles instead of the Old Testament. This tradition goes back to the 4th century and was started by St. Augustine, following earlier practices. The idea is to focus on the time after Jesus' resurrection, showing the early Church's growth and mission. This way, during Easter, the stories from Acts are read almost every day, covering the whole book by the season's end.

The Acts of the Apostles was written by Luke, one of the gospel writers. The Gospel of Luke tells of what Jesus began to do and teach. Luke writes the Acts of Apostles to share what Jesus continued to do and teach through the lives of his followers.

The apostles were the first bishops of the Church. Acts of Apostles recounts the early Church from its infancy as faith communities developed.
