Third Sunday of Lent

Building Faith @HOME

1st Reading: Ex 20:1-17 Responsorial Psalm:19:8, 9, 10, 11 Second Reading:1 Cor 1:22-25 Gospel:Jn 2:13-25

In today's first reading, we are reminded of the Ten Commandments. The Gospel invites us to reflect upon our worship of God. For Jesus and his Jewish contemporaries, the Temple was an important, holy place where they gathered to worship God, to pray and keeping the sabbath day holy by recognizing the need and desire to be in right relationship with God. Each week as we celebrate mass together at church, we do what Scriptures call us to do:

First: We confess our sins and ask for forgiveness in the Penitential Act because we acknowledge our failure to obey the ten commandments; Then we listen to the Word of God and express our expectations in the General Intercessions asking God to help us in answer to our prayers; Next: We invite the Holy Spirit to come down upon bread and wine, so that as we receive that bread and wine, really changed into the Body and Blood of Christ, we can be filled with the life of God himself, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Finally, we are sent to share with the world through our actions and through the proclamation of the Gospel, the Good News of Jesus as our Savior.

Jesus cleansed the Temple because sinful activities interfered with worship. Today's gospel provides an image to help us "spring clean" our lives. How are we keeping the Sabbath? How are we reverently loving God? How are we respecting others? What vices can we remove? Do I need to cleanse my heart of attitudes or actions that are coming between me and God?

Family Table Talk

Children: Share one way in which you "honor your father and mother."

Youth: Jesus was angry – as we all get at times. When is your anger a good thing? When is it not?

Adults: As you hear the Commandments proclaimed today, which one of them really strikes you?

Pray - Pray for those who live alone

Fast - Fast from negative thoughts.

Give - Give a smile to others, it will brighten their day



The Scrutinies

On the 3rd, 4th, and 5th Sundays of Lent, the rites called the Scrutinies are celebrated with catechumens (those to be baptized on Holy Saturday. At this time, the catechumens are referred to as the Elect. The scrutinies are not just for those in the process of initiation, but more importantly, it is an opportunity for the all members of the parish to "scrutinize" their own lives. When we celebrate the Scrutinies at Mass, we are not scrutinizing the Elect. Rather, they are scrutinizing their own lives before God and we are called to do the same along with them. The goal is to be strengthened to overcome the power of sin.
