Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Building Faith@HOME

1st Reading: Mk 11:1-10
Responsorial Psalm:22:8-9, 17-18, 1920,23-24
Second Reading: Phil 2:6-11
Gospel: Mk 14:1-15:47

Palm Sunday begins with jubilation as Jesus enters into Jerusalem. The crowd cheers and shouts "Hosana" while waving palms. As participants in today's liturgy, we are immersed into the readings, doing the same actions. As we continue in the Liturgy of the Word, we, the crowd, journey with Jesus to the Cross. As the Gospel is read, the crowd in Jerusalem quickly changes their tone. Shouts of joyful "Hosana" become angry demands, "Crucify him!" We come to realize that Jesus is sacrificing himself for our sinfulness. Jesus loves us beyond imagination. He is our Savior. Holy Week invites us all to let go of self love and embrace the Lord anew by saying 'Yes' to the invitation to continuing conversion. How desperately we all need to hear the Good News that we can begin again!

As we begin this journey with Jesus, we can identify times in our lives when we too may have felt abandoned. All of our own sufferings can be shared in the passion of Christ. His suffering was not in vain but rather became a source of abundant life for us. So our suffering and times of feeling alone can be joined to Christ and transformed by God into a source of life. Christ promises to be with us so we never are left alone. (*Living Liturgy*, Liturgical Press. 2024. pg. 89,)

Missionary Discipleship: "Over the coming days, the Church invites us to accompany our brother Jesus on his journey to Jerusalem. The liturgies of Holy Week offer chances to feel with Jesus and his disciples - the palm branches waving joyfully, the water that washes over our feet, the bread and wine shared in memory of Christ, and the wood of the cross. As you read and hear the passion narrative, keep an eye on all the unnamed characters who bring the story to life. If you were present at the passion, what role do you hope you would play?" (Living Liturgy, Liturgical Press. 2024. pg. 89,)

Children: Name one thing that you will do each day this week to remind you that Jesus died and rose to new life for you.

Youth: We hear the story of Jesus' death each year. What did you hear differently this year? How has your faith changed in the past year?

Reverence for Blessed Palms

Because the palms are blessed, they are now sacramentals, which "are sacred signs instituted by the Church. They prepare [us] to receive the fruit of the sacraments and sanctify different circumstances of life" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1667). Sacramentals should be treated with respect and never be thrown away. Palms may only be burned or buried.



2024 - A Year of Prayer

'Jesus was praying in a certain place, and when he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray..." '- Luke 11:1

"We adore Thee, O Christ, and we praise Thee, because by Your holy cross, You have redeemed the world."



You may be familiar with the repetitive chant that is sung, "Jesus, Remember Me." This is among the best-known refrains from the Taizé Community in France. "Jesus, Remember Me" is a short refrain that quotes Luke 23:42:

One of the robbers crucified with the Savior cried out, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom" (Luke 23:42). Jesus responded, "I tell you the truth, today you will be with me in paradise" (v. 43). This humble plea of a sinner for divine mercy is all the more poignant today as our Savior in heaven continues to pray for his people.

During this Holy Week, add this hymn to your prayer time as you journey with and accompany Jesus to Jerusalem.
